Salem's Bible and Crown Windows



On the **Bible Window**, you can see on the top the palms, which remind us of Palm Sunday and Jesus' entry in

November 2014

Jerusalem, and the lily, which reminds us of Easter and Christ's resurrection. The name of those who gave the window or in memory of whom the window was given is encircled with a heart. This reminds us of God's great love for us, and of the love for God and people that prompted the gift of the window. At the center of the window is the Bible. The Bible is God's Word for us, and the source of our faith and hope.

Reflect: How can you use the Bible every day?

<u>Pray</u>: Ask God to help you continue to turn to the Bible for comfort, hope, guidance, and learning.



The **Crown Window** reminds us that Christ is our King, and that He will establish His Kingdom of justice and peace.


Read: Revelation 21:1-8 Reflect: Who rules your life?

then sent a third to airlift 65,000 shoeboxes to the children in this devastated area. To those who had lost all their possessions, it was a sign of hope that others cared.

What's Happening in Elementary Sunday School?

The children of the church assemble a bulletin board to reflect what they have learned in their Sunday School class. Five weeks, five bulletins boards, 1 Gospel and 12 great kids!



Week 1: Genesis 1:1 "God created Heaven and Earth." We took a look at the last book of the Bible to get an idea of what God said Heaven actually looks like.



Week 2: In Genesis chapter 1-2, we learned God created plants, animals, and us! (Psalm 139:13-14)



Week 3: Still in Genesis, we see the beginning of us being separated from God. To give us a good picture of

sin, the kids wrote out many sins on dirty paper and glued them to a black sheet. There was even an angel with a fiery sword at the gates of the Garden. (Romans 3:23 and 6:23)



Week 4: This week we learned just how far God was willing to go to show us His love and desire to bring us back to Him. (John 3:16) The bulletin board for this week showed a red sheet with hearts covering the black sheet of sin. This represents Jesus' love and His blood shed for our sins. (Ephesians 1:7)



Week 5: In our final week, we found that Jesus didn't stay dead. (Luke 24:1-6) We learned of Jesus' forgiveness through His resurrection. We don't have to be separated from God, our Father, anymore!

The children were led in a simple prayer just like this one...

"Dear God, I have sinned and I am sorry. Please forgive me. I believe Jesus took the punishment for my sin by dying on the cross. I choose right now to accept Jesus into my heart. Thank you for your forgiveness and for loving me. In Jesus' name. Amen." (Romans 10:13) (1 John 1:9)

A Breakpoint transcript of a recent broadcast of Shepard Smith of Fox News challenged what he called the "hysterical voices" that are scattering fear and anxiety over Ebola in the United States. After recounting to listeners "You should have no concerns about Ebola at all. None. I promise," Smith commented, "Fear not. Do not listen to the hysterical voices on the radio and the television or read the fear-provoking words online. The people who say and write hysterical things are being very irresponsible."

While Smith said, "Fear not." I doubt whether Smith was aware that he was quoting scripture. God and His messengers uttered those important words to believers at least eighty times in the Bible. In some assessments, "fear not" and variations such as "don't be afraid" are the utmost repeated instructions in Scripture. That is suitable, because it also might be the most disobeyed command in our contemporary life. Let us claim our peace of mind in Christ.

Let's not fear, but "In God We Trust."

Two Kings - The Clash of Kingdoms

It is not an accident that this past Sunday, November 23 of the church year, is "Christ the King" Sunday, and it is followed by the first Sunday in the church year, the first Sunday in Advent (November 30). The King of Kings is the same baby who was born in a manger.

Matthew's Gospel records in Chapter 2 the clash of kingdoms that this baby enters. The first sentence sets up the conflict: "During the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews?"

There are two kings! The word "King" (referring to Herod) or "Herod" is mentioned seven times. Opposite these, "child" is mentioned five times. The most powerful forces on earth are arrayed against the child who is the King of Kings.

It is this child that Scripture describes as the Word: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made... The Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:1-3, 14).

This explains who Jesus is and what he has done. It explains the nature of the conflict of kingdoms of the earth and heaven. And it leads us to give thanks and worship this baby born a king. It leads us to live as citizens of one kingdom and not the other. This knowledge of our faith is what gives us understanding of the invisible kingdom to which we belong.

The Sacred Duty of Voting

By tradition, it is our civic duty as Americans to cast our votes on Tuesday, November 4^{th} . In the creation of our

nation there never was a separation of church and state.

In 1642. Woburn, Massachusetts. was by founded Captain Edward Johnson, contemporary of Governor Iohn Winthrop. Captain



Edward Johnson described the town's first election in Wonder-Working Providences of Sion's Saviour in New



England, 1654: "The number of faithful people of Christ... gather into a church... Having fasted and prayed... they joined together in a holy Covenant with the Lord and with one another... Those who chosen to place a government must be men truly fearing God, wise and learned in the truths of Christ... Neither will any Christian of a sound judgment vote for any, but those who earnestly contend for the faith."

Alexis de Tocqueville wrote of elections in <u>Democracy in America</u>, 1835: "If a political character attacks a (religious) sect, this may not prevent even the partisans of that very sect from supporting him; but if he attacks all the sects together, every one abandons him and he remains alone... Moreover, all the sects of the United States are comprised within the great unity of Christianity."

On elections, President Calvin Coolidge stated in a Radio Address, November 3, 1924: "I therefore urge upon all the voters of our country, without reference to party, that they assemble... at their respective voting places in the exercise of the high office of American citizenship, that they approach the ballot box in the spirit that they would approach a sacrament, and there, disregarding all appeals to passion and prejudice, dedicate themselves truly and wholly to the welfare of their country." Calvin Coolidge continued: "When an election is so held, it... sustains the belief that the voice of the people is the voice of God."

On September 20, 2001, President George W. Bush addressed Congress: "Our enemy is a radical network of terrorists... They hate our freedoms - our freedom of religion, our freedom of speech, our freedom to vote."
