The Balance Window

Balances were used to measure and weigh things. They remind us of the judgment when our lives will be weighted to see if we have served well.

Matthew 18:32-33 reads: "Then the king called in the man he had forgiven and said, 'You evil servant! I forgave you that tremendous debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ Shouldn't you have mercy on your fellow servant, just as I had mercy on you?"" (NLT)



The center crosses are entwined within the circle and remind us of Christ's crucifixion. Holly is in the blue green along the side of the window. The three leaves remind us of the three persons of the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. According to an unconfirmed legend, Mary prayed and hid the baby Jesus under a holly bush when they were fleeing to Egypt. The bush put forth leaves and hid the baby from the pursuing soldiers, who had orders to kill all babies. Since then, the holly has kept its leaves all year.

<u>Read</u>: Matthew 18:21-35. <u>Reflect</u>: Who do you need to forgive? <u>Pray</u>: Seek Christ's forgiveness and the love and grace to forgive others.

Without Excuses, Doing God's Will

Some people say, "Oh, if I only knew what God's will is for my life." But, is that their real problem? Their real problem is motivating themselves to do the things they already know God wants them to do. This was shown clearly by an action of Judge Woodrow Seal, a U.S. District Court judge.

Mr. Seal founded The Society of St. Stephen in the Methodist Church. It was a national program with the sole purpose of helping people in need. One day a church invited Mr. Seal to come to their congregation to explain to them how they could begin a Society of St. Stephen in their church. So the judge came. The plan was for him to speak on the various ministries the Society engaged in and then there would be some time for discussion.

While the people took their seats the minister began to introduce Judge Seal and the work of the Society. The judge took some cookies and poured himself some coffee. When the introduction was completed, Judge Seal walked over to the piano, put his coffee cup on top of it, and began to fumble in his coat pockets. Finally, he pulled out a wrinkled piece of paper and from it he read the name of a mother and her four children, including their ages and their clothing sizes.

He noted several other needs this particular family had, and said the address was on the paper, and he laid it on top of the piano. The Judge then said, "If you want to start a Society of St. Stephen, then you should contact this woman by 11:30 AM tomorrow

morning. If you are not able to help her, don't worry, I'll be in with contact her tomorrow, and get her help by midafternoon." With that, Judge Seal remarked, "Now, forgive me, but I really must be going. Thank you for inviting me and for the coffee and the cookies." Then he walked out the door. It all took less than five minutes.

Judge Seal wasn't content to sit around helplessly waiting for God to give him some direction. He knew what God wanted him to do. He knew what God wanted this church to do. The problem is not lack of knowledge of God's will, rather an unwillingness to do God's will. God is calling us to action. Let us do God's will.

A Real Christian

Andrew Young was a former Ambassador to the United Nations, an influential political leader, and an ordained clergyman. James McCormick tells of the conclusion of one of Young's talks where he told about his youngest daughter, and he described her, "She has always been the unpredictable one." While his other children excelled as students, she always made it a point not to try hard.

She wanted to be a dancer or an actor or a singer. And, while the other children paid attention, her father's stern voice only made her eyes flare with rebellion.

Several months before, she came home and announced, "Daddy, I'm going to Uganda to work with 'Habitat for Humanity.'" Andrew Young was shocked. He said, "Do you realize that Idi Amin has wrecked Uganda?" "Yes," she said.

"Do you understand that there is no real government in Uganda?" "Yes," she said. "Are you aware that anybody there can do anything they want to do to you in Uganda, and there is no recourse against them?" "Yes," she said. "And you still want to go to Uganda?" "Daddy," she said. "I am going to Uganda."

And so, three days before he told this story, Andrew Young, powerful political leader, stood helplessly as his youngest daughter boarded a plane and flew off to Uganda to build houses. And there, at the conference, half in jest, and half in fatherly pride, he concluded, "I always wanted her to be a respectable Christian...not a real one!"

What kind of Christian are you? A respectable Christian, a conventional Christian, a "sort of" Christian, or a real Christian? Are you an admirer of Jesus or a follower of Jesus? Why not step out in faith for Christ?
