raised to new life with Christ, set your sights on the realities of heaven, where Christ sits in the place of honor at God's right hand.² Think about the things of heaven, not the things of earth (Colossians 3:1-2. NLT).

Colossians 3 gives us real insight on how to renew our minds to walk as a new person in Christ. The results can be like a person who is depressed, down in the dumps, in despair, and moping in self-pity. Then something happens -- he falls in love. A long-absent friend comes to see him and exclaims: "I don't believe it. You're a new person." Or, a person has a career change, he experiences some success -- and we say, "That made him a new man."


At a much, much deeper level, we become new persons as we put off the old worldly



bitter and angry life and put on the loving new life of Christ. Let me suggest two spiritual disciplines that will assist us in intentionally putting off the old self.

The first disciple is the evening examination of our walk with God. A good time to practice it is at the close of the day -- before you go to bed – or before you go to sleep -- maybe even while you are in bed.

Look back over the day, comb through that day with a small tooth comb -- moving through every segment of the day -- looking at what you have done, or what you failed to do, how you have related to others -- what you have said, or what you failed to say. Think about the way you failed to respond to the needs of others -- the calls God made on your life through people and circumstances, and how you responded to those calls.



Move back through every segment of the day and see where you failed in being the new person God called

you to be -- and, as you come upon those places of failure, take those to the Lord -- cast them off from yourself -- and bury them -- as it were -- in the sea of God's forgiveness and forgetfulness -- put off the old.


It's in the constant practice of that kind of putting off -that we get our lives into harmony with that which we are meant to be when God created us. But, again, it's not simply a matter of having a new lifestyle; it is being a new person.

This is a discipline for putting off the old. Let me now suggest one for putting on the new. It is a part of an internal prayer discipline.

As the discipline of our walk with God is a good one to practice at night, this one is a good one to practice in the morning. In your morning time of prayer, anticipate what you might need during the day. Look at what's going to be happening to you during the day -- anticipate some of the people you are going to meet.

Perhaps, you need patience today to get along with another person. But more -- patience that will enable you to get beyond the surface and touch a soul that may be hurting and has developed an aggressive grating style of relating as a defense for pain.

Think about that person - and put patience. on What about the person from whom you are estranged. There's tension in the relationship. Will you be seeing or talking to that person today? Paul says as



Christians we are to put on forbearance and forgiveness. "Forbearing and forgiving each other," he said, in verse 13. Is that what you need to put on today.

When we put on the new man, all the rules change. Grudges have to go. Revenge is out of the question. We leave judgment to God. We are forbearing and forgiving. We trust God that things will work to the good if we live how God wants us to live.

Will you need humility today? The world doesn't really know what true humility is. Humility has nothing to do with self-depreciation or becoming a door mat. It is in persons who know their true source of power. God's presence and power in their lives gives them certainty and confidence. It is certainty and confidence not in the personal power they hold, but in the Power that holds them. Do you need to put on humility today? We could go on -- I hope you have gotten a picture of the two disciplines. Review your day at bed time for things that you need to ask forgiveness from God. Also, anticipate your day in the morning. Think of who you will meet. What you are going to do, what you are going to need.

Paul's image of putting off and putting on is very clear. It takes us back to the basics of the Christian life.

Christian Gun Ownership

The question often comes up, "Should Christians own guns?" The Bible was written before guns. Therefore, any Bible discussion about guns is based on principles, not direct commands, and is subject to debate among those studying this issue whether the church can link guns to the gospel message.

The Bible includes detailed descriptions of various wars, including predictions of battles in the (coming) end times (such as in Ezekiel 38).

From a personal standpoint, one could ask, "If an armed robber came at (me, my child, spouse, parent, or friend) with a weapon, would I intervene with a gun if I could?" Would God permit or even encourage such an action?

Again, the Bible does not command a person to own or use a gun, yet it also allows for self-defense and defending others. Let's look at three concepts can be found related to guns for Christians to consider.

First, gun ownership is a legal right. The Second Amendment clearly includes the right for all citizens, Christian or otherwise, to "bear arms." Interestingly, the focus in the Second Amendment was not hunting or sport shooting, but civil defense and defense from tyranny of government. The text reads, "A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."

Second, gun ownership is at least an option according to biblical teachings. For example, when soldiers

repented at the preaching of John the Baptist, they asked, "What should we do?" John answered, "Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely—be content with your pay" (Luke 3:14). They were not commanded to leave the military or become pacifists. The disciples also carried small swords at the command of Jesus (Luke 22:38), though Peter was told to put away his weapon at Jesus' arrest (Luke 22:51).

Third, the Bible includes ample evidence to support self-defense. Ecclesiastes 3:3 mentions there is "a time to kill and a time to heal." Verse 8 adds "a time for war and a time for peace." Scripture includes accounts of those who have died for their faith; it also includes accounts of those who have entered armed conflict to defend themselves, their family, and their nation.

Those who argue Christians should not own guns have noble intentions of peace and love. However, in life in this fallen world, there are those who wish to cause harm to others. We must both recognize this reality and prepare how to best defend ourselves, our loved ones, and our nation in such situations.

And Simon, the first disciple, who at Caesarea Philippi confessed, "Jesus, you are the Christ." Jesus said, "Your name is now Peter, the rock on which I will build my church."

Whatever name that was sadly hung on you by the



world, realize that Christ can give you a new name. Instead of outcast, unwanted, or looser. Christ gives us names like

"Beloved.

Desired, and Capable." When we realize how much God loves us, and we internalize that love, we are new people of the light, not of the darkness. Why not talk to God now and tell Him you want a new name to be given to you. He is the same God who sent His very own Son to die for you, because you were "Desired."

- 1C chopped nuts
- Powdered sugar
