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PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

"For the time is coming," says the LORD, "when I will raise up a righteous descendant from King David's line. He will be a King who rules with wisdom. He will do what is just and right throughout the land (Jeremiah 23:5 NLT).

During the American Revolution in the cold of the Christmastime snowy winter, the British would send messages to the patriots to surrender, and their lives and property would be spared. Their return answer universally was, "We have no king but Jesus."



All Christians also can say, "We have a King, and Jesus is our King. We belong to His Kingdom. He is not only a king, but He was born "King of kings."

Jesus was not a king like Louis XIV, who lived in luxury in his Versailles palace of 1000 rooms. He was born in a manger among livestock in a cave. God's kind of King is described as a humble, wise and just ruler. There is no other king like King Jesus.

Paul described Jesus as "the image of the invisible God" and in whom dwells "all the fullness of God." Jesus himself knew who He was, for he said, "The Father and I are one; he who has seen me has seen the Father." All other "kings" are mortal and eventual die. Christ, the King, lives. Because He is God's Son, He was raised by God from death. On Easter, Christ rose to live forever. If He had not, He would be like all other kings. Because of His victory over death, He lives and reigns for all eternity.

Since Jesus is the Messiah, God's only Son, He is the King-Creator. In John's prologue, we are told about Jesus the Creator: "All things were made through Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made" (1:3). Christ is King of kings because He is the Creator of kings.

If Christ, the King, created us, we are children of the King. Paul says we are a new creation in Christ, a new people in a new covenant. Therefore, we have status, dignity, and honor. We are persons of value, for "God made no junk." Remember who you are as a child of the King, a person of worth.

Christ rules the church because the church is His body. Some "churches" are not churches at all. How do we know? Because some of their teachings are not in harmony with the scriptural teachings of Christ the King. The church that Christ rules is one where the Gospel is truly proclaimed, and the Sacraments are administered rightly. Loyal Christian people choose to follow Christ's directives in scripture rather than church leaders.

The most significant difference between Christ, the King, and all other kings is the difference between life and death. In one sense, Jesus died as all kings die, but with one big difference; He rose again on the third day! He was the king who died to save His people from eternal death, from separation from God.

This Christmas season, what will be our responses to this King's dying for you and giving you eternal life? He is Christ the King. But, can you say Christ is your King? He may be the King of the church, but He is not your King until you crown Him King of your life.

Knowing the Christmas story and seeing the baby Jesus in the manger, have you forgotten to crown Him the King of your life? Why not take time now to do that?

The Book of Philippians 1:27-2:11

The apostle Paul spoke to the Philippian church about humble servanthood. As believers, we are to serve one another with humble compassion. When we serve one another, we have unity in our relationships both apart from and within the church. The basis for unity has a fourfold motivation.

First, there is **encouragement** in Christ. During trials and suffering, find encouragement in your relationship with Jesus. Second, we have the consolation of **love**. We know God's love, and His love makes us love others. Third, we share in the **fellowship** with the Spirit. The Spirit unites us as brothers and sisters. Fourth, we share **affection** and **mercy** (or tenderness).

This tender care should cause us to look out for the interests of others and serve sacrificially. Paul points out to the Philippians and us that we can enjoy these amazing blessings as believers. To be united, Paul

says, the church must have the same mentality remembering their identity and a common mission. That is to spread the message of God's love and forgiveness through Jesus Christ.

We must pursue Christ-like humility. We are to follow the way of Jesus, not the way of our culture. We should ask ourselves, "Am I competing for people's attention and approval? Do I find it difficult or easy to rejoice in the success of others? Am I conceited? Do I think I am superior to people? Am I concerned with the needs of others?" There will never be unity in a congregation apart from people walking in humility. Jesus, who had every right to be conceited, instead emptied Himself and associated with us, the lowly. He's our model for humility, and He gives us the power to live out an "others-oriented" lifestyle.

We must live with sensitivity to the needs of others. Only when we possess the grace of humility will we serve others with spiritual sensitivity. We grow in humility by reflecting on the cross of Christ. We see the holiness of God, the sinfulness of man and the grace of our Lord on display at the cross. We grow in humility by reflecting on the glory of Christ. Allow Christ's all-sovereign lordship to create in you humble adoration before Him. We grow in humility by reflecting on God's Word, which reveals to us Christ's humility and exaltation.

Studying the Bible can be an act of humility in itself if you're going to the Bible with the attitude, "I need Your Word more than bread." Get before God and realize that He rules over all; stand in the way of His greatness and regain your perspective on yourself and all of life. Grow in humility through prayer. We must humble ourselves before God's mighty hand regularly and cast our cares on Him. We grow in humility by serving others. As you do this, pray for God to cultivate in you the spirit of humility that was so gloriously displayed in our Lord.

Chapter 2 verses 5-11 gives us a Christ-centered mindset. Paul magnifies the humility and exaltation of Jesus, which should lead us to emulate Jesus' example and adore Him as Lord of all. As a result of adoring Christ and emulating Him, we will experience unity as a people. The more we behold His glory and imitate His character, the more unified we will be as a church.

It is said of Jesus in vs.6 that he did not consider equality with God as something to be grasped, to be used for His advantage. This phrase highlights the astonishing giving nature of Jesus. He did not consider being God grounds for getting but for giving. Paul encourages the church to follow the example of Jesus' service in their relationships with one another. Jesus could've clutched His rights, His blessings, and His benefits as King of glory, but He didn't. He lived openhandedly, showing us what benevolent generosity and service look.

Do you have a hard time letting go of your possessions? Do you find it hard to relinquish your rights to be mad at someone for the good of preserving a relationship? If we applied Jesus' mindset to marriage and other relationships, imagine what our lives would be. How can you go from being a grasper to a giver? You need the gospel; You need Jesus. Through His perfect life and atoning death, He gives us forgiveness and new life, empowering us to live like Him.

During Advent, we reflect on the humble incarnation of Jesus Christ. He emptied Himself. He added humanity; He did not surrender deity. He remained fully God while coming to live here with us as fully human. Jesus endured the physical agony of the cross, the abandonment, the shame, and He received the wrath of God in place of sinners. Isaiah 53 describes this.

Christ's humility follows the spiritual principle, "Whoever humbles himself will be exalted. His incomparable self-humiliation leads to His super-exaltation. He is our Lord. He is the King of Glory. In response to Christ's universal lordship, "at the name of Jesus, every knee shall bow, and every tongue confess... that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father." Vs 10-11. Jesus doesn't keep the glory for Himself, and even in His exaltation, He remains the model of humbly honoring the Father.

Let our attitude be like His. Let our actions reflect Him - all to the glory of God, our Father.

Trustee Report

The congregation recently voted to approve the fiscal year 2020 budget of \$103,416. This was an increase of \$2,263 from the 2019 operating budget. This increase was necessary to account for cost of living increases and inflation. Typically, costs rise by 2-3 percent annually.

Our church has roughly \$120,000 in various mutual funds that we utilize as a financial security blanket and for future planning. These funds if left untouched have the potential to secure our church's existence far into the future with the help of compounding interest. For these funds to work in our favor

it is imperative that we continue to operate the church on tithes and offerings alone and not tap into these mutual funds unless absolutely necessary. Proverbs 21:20 says "In the house of the wise are stores of choice food and oil, but a foolish man devours all he has." This verse is a teaching about financial savings. Choice food and oil = our church's mutual funds and to spend that money willingly is a foolish thing to do according to the teachings of the bible. In the planning of our operating budget we pretend that this money does not exist.

Unfortunately, membership within our congregation has been in decline for the past 20 years mostly due to a shift in modern culture and competition with large contemporary churches. By the grace of God, our tithes and offerings have been just enough to meet or exceed our forecasted operating budget every year. With membership and attendance, being in a steady yet slow decline it has been ever more difficult to procure the necessary funds to support operating costs without dipping into our reserve funds. I humbly ask the recipients of this newsletter to spread the awareness to members everywhere that tithing is incredibly important to the survival and growth of our 171 year old church.

Church Infrastructure Matters

The church has some upcoming infrastructure expenses that will require some fundraising to afford. They are as follows:

- A new chime system needs to be purchased as the current one (Installed 1980) is broken and cannot be repaired due to its age. Estimated new installation cost is \$30,000.
- Over the last 121 years the exterior masonry work on the church has collected a lot of dirt and grim and needs professionally cleaned to maintain the aesthetic and physical performance of the stone and brick. An estimate for this work is currently being researched.
- The asphalt parking lot is deteriorating quickly and will need to be resurfaced. An estimate for this work is currently being sought out.

More information on these items will be published in the coming months.
