# **PASTOR'S THOUGHTS**

"I said, 'Plant the good seeds of righteousness, and you will harvest a crop of love. Plow up the hard ground of your hearts, for now is the time to seek the LORD, that he may come and shower righteousness upon you (Hosea 10:12 NLT)."

In the Bible, God often addresses those who had become lazy and disobedient in their service to the Lord. As this year's plowing season approaches, Scripture challenges us to grow and to change to be more spiritually profitable.

We know that unplowed ground will not let a crop grow. It is hard, preventing seeds from penetrating, germinating, and growing to maturity. So, it is when time to put in a garden, we get out the tiller and turn the soil so that seeds can penetrate to let their roots go down deep where they can find moisture. You can apply this agricultural analogy to spiritual things about what must be done by planting God's Word in your soul.

Remove the rocks, stumps, and weeds of bitterness, hatred, greed, and selfishness to plant something new and fruitful in your heart. Burn the old stumps and get help to remove extra heavy large rocks in your life. Pull out weeds by the roots. When is the last time you were really on your knees broken before the Lord? Have you reconciled and made amends to others? Do you show the Galatians 5:22-23 Fruits of the Spirit in your life of: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control?"

Perhaps, you have put off plowing a particular piece of land because it is too difficult or too painful to deal with an issue in your life. Perhaps, you cannot envision the fruit and grain that can grow there, so you have never bothered. But God is the Great Vinedresser. If you break up the additional fallow ground in your life, he will extend and enlarge your fruitfulness and grant you a more abundant life.

Looking forward to a harvest is a wonderful time to rededicate the fallow tracts of land that make up your life and put them under cultivation for God. Now is the time to break up these unplowed acres and yield them to His growth. He calls you to do this for your reward.

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#### Happy Are the Harnessed

The Beatitude about meekness was taken by Jesus from the words of Psalm 37. Verses 9 and 34 speak to waiting on the Lord. That is perhaps the central idea behind meekness in the **Old Testament**. The meek person is the one who obediently accepts God's guidance, receives what God sends his way and is compliant to the will of God. David, in Psalm 37, says this way of life leads to blessing, expressed in Old Testament terms as inheriting the Promised Land.

Psalm 37 is a psalm I turn to in times of discouragement. Verses 1-8 mention several ways not to worry: "Do not fret...", "Trust in the Lord...", "Delight...in the Lord...", "Commit your way to the Lord...", "Rest in the Lord...". The way not to worry is to rest, trust, commit and delight in the Lord. That is a definition of meekness. It is an active decision to wait, rest, trust, and to leave matters in God's hands. Meekness is accepting God's will in your life with complete confidence that it is best.

One example in the Old Testament is Job. He lost everything, children, livestock, and property. And even his wife criticized him mercilessly. Job wondered during all those trials why it was happening, yet he was able to say, "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1:21). He cried out, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him" (Job 13:15).

In the Old Testament, meekness meant to live under the control of God, to be God-controlled. In the **New Testament**, the word refers more to self-control. After all, being meek is one of the results of being under the control of the Holy Spirit ("gentleness" in the NKJV, Galatians 5:22-23). Jesus defined Himself as "gentle [meek] and lowly in heart" (Matthew 11:29); and in doing so, He personified a perfect definition of New Testament meekness: power under control. One can feel righteous indignation - righteous anger – in the right situation, as Jesus did. But a meek person never flies off the handle, out of control with his anger in a selfcentered way. A meek person acts with power under control. Meekness never gets angry at what happens to itself. It only gets angry at what happens to others. Jesus never reacted in anger when He was personally abused at His trial and crucifixion. But unrighteousness in the temple or abuse of others aroused His righteous anger. Jesus was meek, not weak.



In our lives today, we find there are four areas where meekness is a critical quality. **We need meekness to receive God's Word.** Only by submitting ourselves to the Spirit of God will the Word of God make sense to our human minds. And the power to submit in that way is the power of meekness, the power to recognize that God's Word and wisdom are better than our own.

We need meekness to restore fallen Christians. Great power under control is needed to minister to a fallen Christian soldier – the power not to be judgmental and the power not to fall into the same failure ourselves. Far too often we act toward those who have sinned as though we have never fallen ourselves. We talk about them on the "prayer chain". And even if they are restored to fellowship, we find it hard to treat them as forgiven. That is not meekness. Meekness acknowledges that but for the grace of God, I might have been in their shoes.

We need meekness to reach others with the Gospel. First Peter 3:15 says, "Always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you, with meekness and fear." We would win more people to Christ if we witnessed to them with meekness.

We need meekness to remain unified in our churches. Maintaining unity requires "endeavoring." That is, it requires work. Such unity only happens supernaturally – that is with meekness. Lowliness and gentleness allow people to yield to a greater good than their own self-interests.

Jesus said, "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth." (Matthew 5:5) This refers to the blessings of all the promises of God – which include a new heaven and new earth. The meek are not weak. They are happy (blessed) now and will be happy for eternity.

## The Promised Land

The Promised Land isn't just the physical land that God promised as a heritage to his people. Some refer to heaven as the Promised Land. God's eternal Promised Land is the heritage of all who come to Him through his Son.



If Israel was ever going to enter and abound in the Promised Land, they would first need to walk through the wilderness with God's word in their hearts, they would first need to know how to be brought low (Philippians 4:12).

Like me, and possibly like you, they would need to be taken into the desert and learn the only thing they would ever need is Jesus.

Have you ever had your hopes dashed, a devastating thing happen, or a situation never seems to get better? That's often what the wilderness season feels like.

The Israelites felt the same way. They were set free from the Pharaoh, but they were far from being free from the sins of complaining, lack of trust in God, and stubborn hearts. Their eleven-day journey to the Promised Land turned into 40 years.

In fact, many of those who left Israel never saw or entered the Promised Land. Instead, they wandered the wilderness in a constant cycle of complaining, worshipping idols, and watching God respond. This is why God called them into the wilderness. The wilderness is defined as an uncultivated, uninhabited, and inhospitable region. Do any of these things sound comfortable? They're not supposed to be, it's not a comfortable place because it's temporary.

The wilderness is a womb in which God's character can grow if you let it. It is a make-or-break kind of season. Its purpose is to free you from sin and bondage so you can be transformed into the person God has called you to be.

Our wilderness seasons do not create the cancer that comes out of us; it exposes what was already there but hidden under distractions, business, and abundance.

Because God loves us, he puts these idols in plain view so we can see them, deal with him, and bury them in the desert. There is no place for them in the Promised Land. Romans 8:14-17 reminds us of this:

For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God. The Spirit you received does not make you slaves, so that you live in fear again; rather, the Spirit you received brought about your adoption to sonship. And by him we cry, "Abba, Father." The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children. Now if we are children, then we are heirs heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory.

Depending on how the term is used, the Promised Land represents either a physical location in Israel or "a place or situation where someone expects to find great happiness. When you examine the true meaning and origin of the Promised Land, you will find it first referenced in Genesis 12.

This is the introduction of God's involvement and movement in the Promised Land. He instructs Abram (before God renamed him Abraham) to leave what is familiar to him and go to a land that God predestined for him and his descendants.

"...Get out of your country, from your family and from your father's house, to a land that I will show you. I will make you a great nation; I will bless you and make your name great; and you shall be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and I will curse him who curses you; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed" (Genesis 12:1-3).

Later, God promises him a land flowing with milk and honey. It's not just the land that God promised the Israelites. Israel acquired the Promised Land only through God's guidance and his miraculous intervention in history (Exodus 33:14–16; Psalm 44:1–8; 136:10–22).

At that time, in the Bible, the boundaries of the Promised Land were from the River of Egypt (the Nile) to the Euphrates (Exodus 23:31). Today, it includes modern-day Israel, including Gaza and the West Bank, and Jordan, as well as parts of Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia, and Iraq.

It's also figurative in terms of our relationship with God. Today's more modern definition of the Promised Land speaks about a better life, situation, joy in the Lord, and living the abundant life he promised us. It comes through our obedience and love for our mighty God.

Today, if you are standing in the middle of the wilderness or perhaps, you're standing on the edge of the Promised Land, remember he will never leave you or forsake you. The journey you are on will have victory in Jesus. Embrace the wilderness moments knowing that it will give way to the Promised Land with Christ!
