PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

Then I said, "It's all over! I am doomed, for I am a sinful man. I have filthy lips, and I live among a people with filthy lips. Yet I have seen the King, the LORD of Heaven's Armies" (Isaiah 6:5 NLT).

Think about being in the presence of someone who is as good as you can imagine. No one is perfect of course, but some certainly approach it. You would feel guilty just being in that person's presence. Peter said to Jesus, "Depart from me Lord, for I am a sinful man" when he realized the holiness in Jesus as God.

Such a consciousness of our inadequacy and sinful fallenness is necessary for any real change to take place in our lives as Christians to become more like Christ. Likewise, Isaiah felt that way before the throne of Almighty God.

I'll tell a story: A well-known professional golfer played in a tournament with President Gerald Ford, Billy Graham, and Jack Nicklaus. After the round was over, one of the other pros on the tour asked, "Hey, what was it like playing with the President and Billy Graham?"

The pro said with disgust, "I don't need Billy Graham stuffing religion down my throat!" With that, he headed for the practice tee. His friend followed, and after the golfer had pounded out his fury on a bucket of golf balls, he asked, "Was Billy a little rough on you out there?" The pro sighed and said with embarrassment, "No, he didn't even mention religion."

Commenting on this event, R.C. Sproul, in his book, <u>The Holiness Of God</u>, says, quote...


"Astonishingly, Billy Graham had said nothing about God, Jesus, or religion, yet the pro stomped away after the game accusing Billy of trying to ram religion down his throat." So, what had happened in this encounter? What happened was that, in the presence of this worldfamous evangelist, the golfer was reminded of the existence of the Holy. And, just as importantly, he was convicted of his unholiness. There is no hope for advancement unless, <u>first of all</u>, we are conscious of <u>our need</u>." We must be aware of our sinfulness. Without words spoken, the golfer was challenged to change himself.

Just a year before the death of A.W. Tozer, he was asked to speak at a conference of ministers on any subject he chose. God's holiness was the subject, and he is quoted as saying: "I believe we ought to have again the old biblical concept of God which makes God awful and makes men lie face down and cry, 'Holy, holy, holy, Lord God almighty." That would do more for the church than anything else.

Tozer was right. Have you heard the call of God to a life of holiness, purity, and service? More importantly... have you accepted His call?



The Sacrament of Baptism

"Remember your baptism and be thankful." These words from the liturgy may give us pause for thought.

What is it about baptism that we are called to remember? For what are we giving thanks?

Baptism is one of two sacraments practiced by Presbyterians (Communion is the other). The act of baptism is deceptively simple—but in a handful of water, there is a deep well of mystery and meaning:

• Baptism is a sign and seal of the covenant of grace made by God through Jesus and extended to us.

- In baptism, God claims us as beloved children and calls us to Christian discipleship.
- Through baptism we share in Christ's death and resurrection, and become members of Christ's body, the church.

• The practice of baptism affirms that we are washed clean from sin as we renounce the power of evil and seek the will and way of God.


• We receive the anointing of the Holy Spirit in baptism, who empowers us with gifts for ministry in the church and world.

• Baptism marks us as Christ's own forever, with hope for the fulfillment of God's eternal realm of justice and peace.

What Does the Bible Say? All four Gospels report the baptism of Jesus by John in the Jordan River (Matt. 3:13–17; Mark 1:9–11; Luke 3:21–22; John 1:29–34). Matthew, Mark, and Luke describe the heavens opening, the Spirit descending like a dove, and the voice of God saying: "You are my Son, My Beloved; with You, I am well pleased" (Mark 1:11). Notice that all three Persons of the Trinity are involved. When we are baptized with water in the Name of the Trinity, we share in Christ's baptism. God claims us as beloved children, too, and anoints us with the gift of the Holy Spirit.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus uses the image of baptism to refer to His death, saying to James and John: "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with" (Mark 10:38)? Indeed, baptism is our symbolic participation in Christ's death; however, rising from the water, we also share in Christ's glorious resurrection.

John's Gospel characterizes this transformation as a kind of second birth: Jesus says to Nicodemus, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit" (John 3:5). In baptism we are called to a new way of life as Christ's disciples, sharing the Good News of the gospel with all the world.



Thus, when Jesus appears to the disciples in Galilee after rising from the dead, he gives them this Great Commission: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matt. 28:19).

As the sign and seal of God's covenant, baptism has deep connections with the story of the people of Israel recorded in the Old Testament.

Just as the breath of God swept across the face of the waters of chaos at the creation of the world (Gen. 1:2), the Spirit of God breathes into us the gift of life in baptism.

• Just as God sent a flood in the time of Noah to wash away evil from the earth (Gen. 6–9), in baptism God cleanses us from sin and makes way for a new beginning in our lives.

• Just as God delivered the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt through the waters of the sea (Exodus 14), baptism represents our liberation from captivity to sin and death and the beginning of our journey to the land that God has promised.

• For the people of Israel, circumcision was the principal sign of a covenant relationship with God (Gen. 17:11). Similarly, for Christians, baptism is the mark of our inclusion in God's covenant of grace—a relationship that extends from the children of Abraham and Sarah to the followers of Jesus.

In the Acts of the Apostles, we glimpse the importance of baptism in the early church, as ever-expanding circles of people receive the gospel. On the day of Pentecost, at a gathering of devout Jews, three thousand people were baptized (Acts 2:41). Later, Philip baptized an Ethiopian eunuch (considered unclean under Jewish law) on the road between Jerusalem and Gaza (8:26–40). After his own conversion on the road to Damascus, a persecutor of Christians named Saul (later Paul) is baptized (9:18) and devotes himself to the mission of spreading the gospel.

Peter has a strange vision about eating unclean foods (10:9–16) and comes to understand that "God shows no partiality" among the nations (10:34); he then begins to baptize Gentiles as well as Jews (Acts 10:47). Subsequent chapters of Acts recount the baptisms of entire households (16:11–15; 18:8). The letters of the apostle Paul also reveal the profound significance of baptism for the first Christians.

The Protestant Reformation brought significant changes in the theology and practice of baptism. While Martin Luther (1483–1546) and John Calvin (1509– 1564) continued the tradition of infant baptism, they argued that the power of baptism did not come from the act itself but from its connection with the promise of God conveyed in the Scriptures. The sacrament is thus a "sign and seal" of that promise. Therefore, in the Reformed tradition, the sacrament of baptism is always to be accompanied by the proclamation of the Word.

Luther and Calvin also insisted that baptism be followed by ongoing instruction in the faith, particularly through the study of the Bible and catechisms. In terms of its theological significance infant baptism expresses that it is God who chooses us for faith, discipleship, and salvation; without God, we have no power to claim these things for ourselves. The Reformed inclination toward simplicity in liturgical form and close adherence to the Scriptures meant that many of the accompanying traditions associated with baptism (the giving of candles, for instance) were stripped away. The celebration of baptism as a communal act of public worship was also restored.
