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PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

Although I was not raised a Christian, I became one in my early 20s, and I have many early Christian childhood memories. I remember as a youngster how my family would go downtown Christmas shopping by riding the electric streetcar bus; I always hoped to sit in the back seat to see the electric sparks lighting up the cold winter air from the overhead contact wires.

I remember how the department stores were decorated for the season. Mechanical reindeer moved their heads, and Rudolf's nose would glow red. As you passed, the stores would have speaker music playing on the sidewalks. Christmas lights were everywhere. I would beg my parents to let me have a longer time seeing the electric trains circling the Cincinnati Gas and Electric Company showroom.

Later, when I was four, my family brought us kids to the Cincinnati Gardens to see the Ice Capades Christmas show. The skaters circled and danced and had Christmas season-themed costumes on display. They skated ever so gracefully. For the final act, they depicted Joseph and Mary with the Manger Scene. The star shined brightly. Angels danced around in shimmery outfits. The shepherds arrived with their animals. The kings arrived asking, "Where is the Christ Child?" The lights were dimmed, the candles were lit, and the spotlight centered on baby Jesus and the Christmas star. As a final act, everyone broke out singing "Silent Night."

I sang along with the crowd. It was a magical moment unlike any I had experienced before. I sensed the Holiness of the moment and the divinity of Christ worshipped by many. I wanted to know more about who this Jesus was.

Not everyone is born into a Christian family. When I reached my early twenties, my full faith started to click with me. Having faith and being a Christian means consciously choosing to follow God daily. It was like the first time I took the car out of cruise control and started driving and taking more ownership of my faith. Salem reenacts the Christmas story in several ways to reach out and share Christ.



What a special moment to realize when life clicked that God became a helpless baby born in poverty to a teenage couple. Jesus was not born in a privileged palace. He was born so that we can relate to our Savior, who was born to die to pay for our wrongs so that we can be made right with God and go to the promised heaven where all things will be made right and perfect. All our wrongs are forgiven by the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross if He is our Lord. Isn't that what we all deeply desire?

The reason for the season is not shopping, entertainment, or food. Somehow, the real message gets through. Christ is the reason for the season! Merry Christmas!

Silent Night

The original lyrics come from a poem written in 1816 by the Austrian priest Josef Mohr (1792–1848). The story goes that when the church organ broke down on Christmas Eve in 1818, Josef asked Franz Gruber (1787–1863) to compose a melody for the poem.

Franz created a guitar accompaniment, and at the mass that evening they performed the new song together with the children's choir. The English lyrics was written by John Freeman Young (1820–1885) in 1859.

Silent night, holy night! All is calm, All is bright Round von Virgin, Mother and Child Holy Infant so Tender and mild, Sleep in heavenly peace, Sleep in heavenly peace. Silent night, holy night! Shepherds quake at the sight! Glories stream from heaven afar, Heavenly hosts sing Al-le-lu-ia! Christ the Saviour is born! Christ the Saviour is born! Silent night, holy night! Wondrous star, lend thy light! With the angels let us sing Alleluia to our King! Christ the Saviour is here. Jesus the Saviour is here! Silent night, Holy night! That night, God healed the divide between God and man. God came to earth to live and to love His people face to face. He was Emmanuel, God with us. All was calm, and all was bright. This silence is worth seeking. It is worth turning everything down to sit in awe and wonder of this child of the promise!



The Christian Trinity and Prayer

"Through Him, we both have access by one Spirit to the Father." Ephesians 2:18

The Holy Trinity is one of the mysteries of the almighty God. God is One, manifesting Himself in three persons: the Father, The Son, and the Holy Spirit. I am not bothered by the fact that it is a great mystery and difficult to grasp. If I could understand everything, there would not be much to it. This is why the Christian life is a life of faith. Philosophy might attempt to explain it, but it cannot change. Christianity changes lives even though some of the Bible's explanations of God's grandeur and grace are unexplainable.



We often hear skeptics exclaim that the word "Trinity" cannot be found in the Bible. But we do not have to see the word to discover the truth throughout Scripture. The Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—is present at Jesus' baptism. The Son stands there, the Father speaks from heaven, and the Spirit descends on the Lord like a dove from heaven (Luke 3:22).

When we come to Ephesians 2:18, we have reached one of the mountain peaks of Scripture, and the secret is found in three prepositions – to, through, and by. In this short verse is found the mystery of the Trinity in relationship to our prayer life. Prayers are to be offered "to the Father." He is the Author and Initiator of our salvation. Our prayers will be offered "through Him (the Son)." He is the One who came to execute God's plan of redemption through His substitutional and voluntary death on the cross and His resurrection from the grave. Finally, our prayers are offered "by one Spirit." He is the One who convicts of sin, empowers us for service, and helps us in our prayer life. The Father, the Son, and the Spirit all work together for you and me to access God.

The **Source** of Prayer – Prayer is "to the Father." All true prayers begin when I claim my relationship with Him and begin to know and love Him in the intimacy of Father and child. For me, this relationship began when I was seventeen and trusted in Christ as my personal Savior. Since that day, I have grown to know Him as my heavenly Father. He is the source of our prayer life.

The only way God can be called "Father" is if we have been born again spiritually into His family through what Jesus called, in John, being born again (John 3:7). It might surprise some of us to know that we are not all God's children. We are all God's creation, but the Bible states clearly that "as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to be called children of God" (John1:12). And Paul, in his letter to the Galatians, makes it crystal clear, saying that we become children of God "through faith in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:26).

The gospel writers record that Jesus began prayer over seventy times using the word "Father." What a privilege for you and me to acknowledge that He is the source of prayer by addressing Him as Father. When we pray, we are not trying to appease a demanding parent, but we are children who, because of our relationship with Him, can come boldly before our Father's throne (Hebrews 4:16).

The **Course** of Prayer – If the Father is the source of prayer, the Son is the course through which we go to make our petitions known. Prayer is "through the Son." In fact, there is no access to the Father unless we go through the Son. The apostle Paul makes this plain: "There is one God and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all" (1 Timothy 2:5-6). Apart from Christ, we have no access to God.

Jesus Christ is our High Priest. In the Old Testament, on the Day of Atonement, the high priest would take the blood of a sacrificial lamb, enter beyond the veil of the Holy of Holies, and sprinkle the blood on the mercy seat of the ark. Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God, made the final sacrifice for sin. He shed His blood on the cross, died, and rose the third day, passed through the heavens, and presented His blood at the throne of God. No wonder Paul said, "Through Him, we both have access by one Spirit to the Father."

It is through Christ – not through the church, not through a priest, not through the Virgin Mary, but through Him and Him alone. Jesus is the course of true prayer.



The **Force** of Prayer – Effective, powerful prayer is "by one Spirit." If the Father is the source, and the Son is the course, then the Spirit is the force behind it all. The Holy Spirit prays in us and through us empowers us to pray with results. Jude reminds us that we are built up in our most holy faith when "praying in the Holy Spirit" (Jude v. 20).

It is the Holy Spirit who "helps us in our weaknesses. For we do not know what we should pray for as we ought" (Romans 8:26). We can read the great prayers of saints down through the ages and recite prayers by rote from memory. But without the Holy Spirit, we will never be effective in our prayer journey. It is only through Christ and "by one spirit" that we can touch the Father in prayer.


Access to the Father is the goal of all prayer. He is the source. We must go through His Son and be empowered by His Spirit. Yes, "For through Him (Jesus) we both have access by one Spirit to the Father."

ICE – Today, when you see a piece of ice in your glass, let it be a reminder that H2O is found in three forms: liquid, solid, or steam. Three manifestations of the same H2O. And so, the holy Trinity manifests Himself in three persons: the Father, who is the **source** of our prayer; the Son, who is the **course** of our prayer; and the Spirit, who is the **force** behind it all.

There is one God and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all (1 Timothy 2:5-6).

Welsh Recipes

Cinnamon Cake – Teisen Sinamon

Dark in colour and almost gingery in flavour, this is one of the most traditional of Welsh cakes.

8 oz. self raising flour 4 oz.caster sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 3 eggs, separated Pinch of salt A little milk to moisten 4 oz. butter 1 tbs golden caster sugar

Raspberry or strawberry jam

Set oven to 350 F. Grease a shallow 8-inch baking tin. Sieve the flour, cinnamon, and pinch of salt together in a bowl. Rub in the butter. Add the caster sugar and the beaten egg yolks to the flour mixture and mix well to a fairly stiff consistency. Add sufficient milk to moisten slightly. Turn the mixture into the tin and bake for 25 minutes until baked. Turn out and cool on a wire rack. Reduce oven temperature to 325 F. For the topping, whip the egg whites until stiff and fold in the golden caster sugar. Spread jam over the top of the cake and then pile on the meringue mixture. Return to the oven and cook for about 20 minutes until the meringue is set and pale golden brown. The dessert is best eaten immediately.
