"Your Majesty," Cagular said, "if you spared the life of my wife, I would die for you."


The Emperor was so moved that he freed both Cagular and his wife, returning them to their province.

A Prayer for the Parents of a Prodigal Child

"20 "So he returned home to his father. And while he was still a long way off, his father saw him coming. Filled with love and compassion, he ran to his son, embraced him, and kissed him" Luke 15:20 NLT).

The parable of the prodigal son is a familiar one among believers and is often shared in faith-based circles or among youth groups. It provides a valuable lesson of hope. Yet, when this story hits close to home and a faithful parent witnesses the falling away of their own flesh and blood, it can be unbearable at times, and there is a sense of sheer helplessness.

A few years ago, we watched our oldest drift in life and follow a destructive path. Although he was raised in the church and read Bible stories since he had been in the womb, it's almost as if something inside him snapped and in a few short months a destructive pattern of behavior emerged. It was heartbreaking. It is still heartbreaking as he teeters over the line between worldliness and faith. Yet, when he goes with us to church, and I see him lift his hands in praise to worship the Lord, I know deep in my heart that while the enemy may be wooing him, he still belongs to God. He is His Son, first and foremost.

This must have been precisely how the prodigal son's father felt upon seeing his son from a distance. Although he knew his son had squandered his inheritance, wasted his life on sinful pleasures, and essentially ran away from all that was good, seeing his son made him rejoice.

Maybe you are a parent of a prodigal son or wayward daughter, awaiting their return home physically and/or spiritually. If so, let me first extend my heartfelt sympathy and say how very sorry I am that you are in this situation. I wish there were the perfect words that could comfort your wounded heart. However, I do know and understand the anguish and exhaustion that comes from raising a child in the way they should go only to watch them part ways with it.

However, if I can extend any hope and encouragement to you today, it is this: you are not alone in this journey. There are so many parents who are fighting the same

battles and often do so in silence. As a parent of a wayward son who has made plenty of my own parenting mistakes, I am slowly coming to grips with a realization. Maybe you need to be reminded too?



Your children's choices aren't a reflection of your parenting skills but rather a harsh reminder of the challenges of raising kids in a lost and broken world (Romans 3:23). God gives us the free will to choose between good and evil, so we must lay the spiritual foundation and then give them the freedom to choose as well (Matthew 22:37).

The truth of the matter is that your child may be choosing to live in a manner that is displeasing to you, but there are consequences for choosing their own way and not obeying God and His will (Colossians 3:25). Sometimes our children need to learn that the hard way and may even hit rock bottom. As sad as it is to hear those words, we have hope, and God's Word offers help! Oh, dear friend, we must hold on to the truth that we serve a God that is merciful and forgiving and is continually pursuing us, no matter how far we venture off or how much our sins try to consume us (Luke 15:4-6). That means that the prayers of a parent for their prodigal child are so very powerful, and we can pray for deliverance and God's hand of mercy over them!

Let's Pray:

Father God, You are our true source of hope and the place we can go for help when we are desperate and weary. Today I lift my broken heart to You in need of the hope that can only be found in Your love, mercy, and grace. I have done my best to raise my son/daughter (name) in a Godly home, but I admit I have made plenty of mistakes. Please forgive me where I have failed You or my child and provide healing to the wounds that have been acquired on this journey.

Lord, I thank you for my son. I deeply love him, but the choices and decisions that he is making are causing a wake of destruction and so much tension to our relationship. I know You have a plan for him, and even in the midst of these trials there is a purpose, so I hold tightly to the promise that this will be a part of his testimony and can be used for good.

O God, I know You are so much stronger than any wicked influences that are found in this world, and the temptations that my son faces, which is why I have faith that he will not be able to permanently depart from the foundation that was set before him (Proverbs 22:6). I plead with my whole heart for You to release him of this sinful hold, that every lie from the deceiver will be brought to light, and that he will seek repentance. I pray no weapon formed against my child prosper because the love, mercy, and blood of Jesus covers him. I ask all of this in Your holy and precious name, Jesus, amen.

How to Have Joy in Hard Times

Once, there was a big boat. There were precisely 276 people on board, and precisely 275 of them were freaking out. They knew the boat was going down. The storm was way too much.

They gave up hope entirely. "We're totally going to drown!" they said. But then there was one guy who was totally calm. It wasn't the captain, or some other veteran sailor who'd seen it all. No, all the salty professionals were freaking out too.

So, you wonder: Was this calm guy an idiot? Couldn't he see the obvious? To not be anxious in the middle of all that, you'd have to lack basic knowledge about how the world works, right?

Turns out the guy—Paul, in the Bible—wasn't an idiot. He didn't lack knowledge. No, he was calm because he knew *more* than everyone else on board. He told them the ship would go down but everyone would survive and be just fine. And so it did, and so they were. (It's in Acts 27–28).

I tell you this story because in our culture now it's kind of like we're all in a big boat, and everyone's freaking out. Anxiety and anger are so widespread that if you're not anxious and angry, people will suspect it's because you're willfully ignorant of all the Big Issues. You just don't know, or you don't care, because if you did, you'd be just as scared and ticked off as they are.



Finding Joy in an Angry World

I've noticed people will get angry if I'm not angry enough about the things they happen to be angry about. They think I don't care. Or they think I'm naive at best. "Don't you know about this crisis, and that injustice, and this other tragedy?"

But then there it is, this joy thing, and I love how Dallas Willard defined it: Joy is "not a passing sensation of pleasure, but a pervasive sense of well-being." No matter what happens, that sense of well-being is there. It might seem impossible or even crazy to live this way in a world of anger and anxiety. But I want you to know that it's possible. And not only that, I want you to know that joy is quite reasonable, in light of reality properly understood. Jesus kept showing His followers that too. Yes, horrible things happen. Yes, there is great evil in the world. But joy—this sense of well-being—doesn't come from knowing less. Joy comes from knowing more.

Do You Believe What Jesus Believes?

I believe we lack joy not because we now know too much but because we know too little.

Or we've forgotten what we knew.

Think about it: Jesus basically said in John 16:33, "Yes, I know you will have problems. I know. But here's some additional information that might interest you—something I know but you don't . . ."

And then He told us to be of good cheer.

God is quite aware of all the suffering and injustice, thank you; but if we believe what Jesus believes, we'll have a sense of well-being no matter what.

Yes, pain and suffering are real. But in Jesus' worldview, despair is not the deepest reality. We know it is fleeting. Joy underpins everything. The deepest note rings through our lives, even in tragedy.

We'll hurt, cry, and go through tremendous loss. We might be deeply unhappy. And yet . . . His peace persists.

So yes, there is a "second naivete," a second *simplicity*. It's an innocence and a beautiful, peaceful life we can live in light of what we can know.

Like, say, how this all ends.

The Five Solas of Protestantism

The Five Solas of Protestantism define how Salem Church and our Presbyterian denomination differ from other churches and their denominations.

The Five Solae (or Solas)

The "Five Solae" (the Latin plural of "sola") are a collection of theological statements expressing a distinction in Protestant thought against Catholic tradition. Though these statements were never made in such a format during the Reformation itself, they have come to represent its principal claims.

Of course, like all summaries, they paint with a broad brush, and overlook distinctions between Lutheranism, Calvinism, Anglicanism, and other Protestant movements. But they are helpful for understanding the Reformers' overall disagreements with Catholicism.

Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone)

Scripture alone is the authority on Christian doctrine. Often considered the central "sola" or principal of the Reformation, "sola scriptura" contrasts the Catholic (and Orthodox) view that church tradition — through councils, creeds, decrees, and other teachings — is intertwined with Scripture as the source of Christian truth.

Sola Fide (Faith Alone)

Justification by faith alone. Justification (how we are made righteous and cleansed of sin — not technically the same as salvation, which Christ granted to all people at Calvary, but often merged) happens simply through trusting in Jesus's sacrifice for us on the cross. This is in distinction to the traditional Catholic teaching that justification requires human participation in the acceptance of Divine Grace.

Sola Gratia (Grace Alone)

Salvation through grace alone. Closely related to sola fide, sola gratia means God's free grace is sufficient for our salvation. There are no "good works" or charity we can do to make ourselves more worthy. (In fact, this view is shared by most Christian denominations, including Catholicism; it's the justification part where they differ.)

Sola Christus (Christ Alone)

Christ alone mediates between God and humanity. Priests are not a separate class able to intervene on behalf of laypeople — only a direct relationship with Jesus Christ provides access to God the Father. People should therefore confess to God directly, not to priests, who cannot offer absolution.

Sola Deo Gloria (Glory to God Alone)

God alone deserves the glory of worship. This principle rejects any veneration of Mary, the saints, and angels. They may be worthy of admiration — but only because the Holy Spirit made them so. They are *not* worthy of devotion.
